7.1 Unverified Claims in the Media About Wasaga Beach Provincial Park

Discussion took place regarding the Council motion passed at the previous meeting, including the associated issues. Mrs. Monsma provided an update on staff efforts aimed at addressing the concerns.

7.2 Final Annual Report and Presentation

The committee reviewed the final report and discussed several additions, including the inclusion of trails and the Small Business Enterprise Centre. It was decided to invite representatives from the resource members to a upcoming fall meeting. The committee further discussed the events section of the report and agreed that attracting a signature food festival to the community would be beneficial, as many popular tourism destinations host such events, and we currently do not. With the report now finalized, Chair Harlow will present it on behalf of the committee at the August meeting.

7.3 Tourism Website Feedback

The committee discussed the new tourism website, and Ms. Monsma provided an update on the changes made in response to previous committee feedback. Key topics included the importance of showcasing a diverse range of images, better methods for promoting and communicating the trails in Wasaga, and the need to improve the business directory, as the current list is incomplete and may give visitors the wrong impression of the town's offerings. The committee also explored options for increasing user engagement on the site, such as utilizing programs like CrowdRiff. Additionally, members advised staff to incorporate language highlighting Wasaga Beach as the 'Music Capital of Ontario,' aligning with the town's branding goals. Staff will consider these suggestions for future website improvements.

7.4 Fireworks

The committee discussed the topic of fireworks and potential alternatives, weighing both the challenges and benefits associated with their use. While some members felt that fireworks should continue, others expressed the view that it may be time to end them. It was noted that a fireworks report had been submitted to Council within the past year. The committee agreed to add this report to the next meeting's agenda for further discussion.

7.5 TDMP

Staff provided an update on the ongoing implementation of the Tourism Destination Management Plan. This includes the creation of dedicated

landing pages to effectively communicate the plan to the public, as well as organizing engagement events for late fall and winter. Staff is also preparing a recommendation for the Municipal Accommodation Tax, which is one of the immediate action items outlined in the plan. Additionally, staff shared a list of action items for the committee to address. It was agreed that these will be discussed at the next meeting.

7.6 T3 Accelerator

Staff updated the committee on the T3 Accelerator Program, noting that it is still in progress and being actively executed. The committee suggested inviting RTO7 to an upcoming meeting to discuss the program, with the goal of increasing Wasaga Beach's involvement.

Important Terms

Indigenous Peoples: Is a collective name for First Nations, Inuit and Metis people who are the original inhabitants of the land that is now called Canada.

First Nation: First Nations are the descendants of the original inhabitants of Canada. Various nations, beliefs and languages exist within this group.

Inuit & Inuk: Inuit is the term for Indigenous peoples from Artic North regions of Canada, Greenland and Alaska. Inuit is the plural form, while Inuk is the singular term.

Metis: The Metis are post -contact Indigenous Peoples. Metis refers to the people with roots in the Red River community or other historic Metis communities. While Metis refers to people of mixed Indigenous ancestry.

Traditional Lands or Territory: These are the lands upon which Indigenous people have historical and currently inhabit, including lands and waterways used for hunting, gathering and trade.

Reconciliation: An ongoing process of establishing and maintaining respectful relationships.








The lands were infiltrated by explorers, fur traders, Jesuits and missionaries.




HISTORY

WATER IS LIFE

The waters were life, we used them to drink from, wash, clean, cook, water crops and the major use was transportation. The water ways were the life blood of travel, and this was the only way we traveled long distances.





ANISHNAABE (OJIBWAY)

Anishinaabe people lived in wigwams living in balance with mother earth.

TIONONTATE (PETUN)

Petun also lived in balance with the land and homes and everyday items were used from the land.





ANISHNAABE (ODAWA, POTAWATOMI, OJIBWAY)

The Anishinaabe in the area are
Saugeen, the Chippewas of
Nawash and Chiminising First
Nation and have been in this
area for a long time.



TIONONTATI (PETUN)

The Tionontati (Petun) known as the tobacco nation or people of the hills.






LANDSCAPE FOREVER CHANGED

RECOMMENDATION:

1. **THAT** the report titled: Revised Land Acknowledgement, to the Council meeting of June 13, 2024, be received; and

- 2. **THAT** the presentation from Muckpaloo Ipeelie of the Urban Inuit Identity Project be received; and
- THAT Council adopt the revised Land Acknowledgement Statements (Appendix C & D) for use at the start of all council, committee and advisory committee meetings and other significant meetings and events.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

 The current Land Acknowledgement statement lacks specificity to the Town of Wasaga Beach. The revised statement proposed is a more accurate and meaningful recognition of the Town's commitment to recognizing, and working in partnership with, the First Nations, Inuit and Metis people.

BACKGROUND:

Land acknowledgements recognize and honor the local Indigenous community, their historical and current connection to the land, and the impacts of colonialism. However, they risk becoming token gestures rather than a meaningful practice if not approached thoughtfully.

In September 2022, previous Council adopted the current Land Acknowledgement (Appendix A). This statement was a direct duplication of Clearview Township's, with the simple revision of the municipality's name.

Staff recommend revising the current Land Acknowledgement statement to be more accurate and meaningful to the First Nations that have, and currently, occupy our specific geographic region.

In late 2023, staff began working with the Inuit Identity Project to look for ways to promote greater inclusivity and increase First Nations representation in Town programming and events. Inuit Identity Project curated both the Pipe Ceremony and Art Exhibit in the RE/MAX Room during the Breaking the Ice Festival.

DISCUSSION:

Inuit Identity Project, in collaboration with Vanessa Kennedy of Red Quills, have authored the revised Land Acknowledgement statement.

During the June 13, 2024 Council meeting, CEO of the Inuit Identity project, Muckpaloo Ipeelie, presented Council with an educational session on the Indigenous groups that have occupied our region.

Wasaga Beach is located on the historical Lands of the Tionontati people, who were part of a larger Wyandot group until 1650. These lands spanned from Midland, Barrie to Craigleigth and were collectively known as Wendake. The Beaver wars and European interaction weakened the Wyandot group and they left or became absorbed into local First Nations groups. Since that time, the Anishanaabe and Three Fires Confederacy, and Haudenosaunee groups have continued to care and use this Land.

The strong spiritual connection to the waterways for these First Nations groups is highlighted in the revised Land Acknowledgement statements.

The revised Land Acknowledgements also states our commitment to inclusivity and reconciliation as we move forward in being sustainable caretakers of the land and waterways.

Staff suggest using the **Revised Land Acknowledgement statement – long form** (Appendix C) during Council and inter-organizational meetings, and the **Revised Land Acknowledgement statement – short form** (Appendix D) during committee, and internal meetings.

CONCLUSION:

The proposed revised Land Acknowledgement statement embodies a more accurate and meaningful recognition of the Town's commitment to recognizing, and working in partnership with, the First Nations, Inuit and Metis people. It emphasizes inclusivity and sustainable stewardship, and better reflects the spirit of truth and reconciliation.
